GOOD FRIDAY



Tonight the church remembers the crucifixion of our Lord. Our remembrance, while solemn, is not a message of gloom, but the awe-filled adoration of the Son of God as he offers up his life as the Lamb of God. Good Friday is part of the larger celebration of the mystery of salvation begun yesterday (Maundy Thursday) and culminating at the celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord (Easter). Worship on Good Friday is not a funeral service for Jesus, but an austere time of reflection, intercession, adoration of the Lamb of God, and quiet meditation. We gather to *celebrate* the sacrifice of the cross.

In keeping with the solemnity of the day, there will be no pre-service or post-service music. Silence for meditation is appreciated. God bless your worship.

WORDS OF ENTRANCE FOR GOOD FRIDAY

Minister: Out of the depths I have called to you, O LORD.

Lord, hear my voice.

Let your ears be attentive to the sound of my cry for mercy.

If you, LORD, kept a record of guilt, O Lord, who could stand?

But with you there is pardon, so you are feared.

I wait for the LORD. My soul waits,

and in his word I have put my hope.

My soul waits for the Lord

more than watchmen wait for the morning,

more than watchmen wait for the morning.

Israel, wait confidently for the LORD, because

with the LORD there is mercy.

With him there is abundant redemption.

So he himself will redeem Israel from all its guilt. (*Psalm 130*)

The time has come for the Son of Man to be glorified.

Now is the judgment of this world.

Now the ruler of this world will be thrown out.

Father, the time has come. Glorify your Son so that your Son may glorify you. Holy Father, protect them by your name, which you gave me, so that they may be one as we are one.

M: We pray. In the name of our God, to whom all hearts are open and from whom no secrets are hidden: purify our hearts through your Holy Spirit so that we may love you as you deserve and be worthy of magnifying your holy name through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

C: Amen..

M: Jesus commanded us: “Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. Love your neighbor as yourself.” If we say we are without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, God is faithful and just to forgive us and purify us from all sin.

Silence to reflect on the Word of God and to examine ourselves.

M: Let us confess our sins against God and against our neighbors:

C: God of mercy, we confess that we have been enslaved by sin and cannot free ourselves. We have sinned against you in thought, word, and action, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. By the love of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. Forgive us, renew us, and direct us by your Holy Spirit, so that your will may be our joy and we may walk in your ways forever, to the glory of your name. Amen.

M: Almighty God, our heavenly Father, in his great mercy has given us his Son. By his life and death, God cleansed us from all sin. By his resurrection we have eternal life as Jesus said, “Because I live, you also will live.” For this reason, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen. *(Please be seated.)*

HISTORY OF THE PASSION, JESUS' DEATH ON THE CROSS

Minister: Two other men, who were criminals, were led away with Jesus to be executed. They brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha, which means, "The place of a skull."

CONGREGATION: They offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it.

MEN: They crucified him there with the criminals, one on his right and the other on his left.

Minister: Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."

WOMEN: Now it was the third hour when they crucified him.

CONGREGATION: Pilate also had a notice written and fastened on the cross. It read, "Jesus the Nazarene, the King of the Jews."

MEN: Many of the Jews read this notice, because the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city, and it was written in Aramaic, Latin, and Greek.

Minister: So the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but that 'this man said, "I am the King of the Jews."

MEN: Pilate answered, "What I have written, I have written."

WOMEN: When the soldiers crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one part for each soldier. They also took his tunic, which was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom.

Minister: So they said to one another, "Let's not tear it. Instead, let's cast lots to see who gets it." This was so that the Scripture might be fulfilled which says:

They divided my garments among them and cast lots for my clothing.

MEN: So the soldiers did these things. Then they sat down and were keeping watch over him there.

WOMEN: People who passed by kept insulting him, shaking their heads and saying, "You who were going to destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross!"

Minister: Those who were crucified with him also insulted him. In the same way the chief priests, experts in the law, and elders kept mocking him.

CONGREGATION: They said, “He saved others, but he cannot save himself. If he’s the King of Israel, let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God. Let God rescue him now, if he wants him, because he said, ‘I am the Son of God.’”

MEN: One of the criminals hanging there was blaspheming him, saying, “Aren’t you the Christ? Save yourself and us!”

WOMEN: But the other criminal rebuked him. “Don’t you fear God, since you are under the same condemnation? We are punished justly, for we are receiving what we deserve for what we have done, but this man has done nothing wrong.”

MEN: Then he said, “Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingdom.”

Minister: Jesus said to him, “Amen I tell you: Today you will be with me in paradise.”

WOMEN: Jesus’ mother, his mother’s sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene were standing near the cross.

Minister: When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to his mother, “Woman, here is your son!” Then he said to the disciple, “Here is your mother!” And from that time this disciple took her into his own home.

CONGREGATION: It was now about the sixth hour, and darkness came over the whole land until the ninth hour, while the sun was darkened.

Minister: At the ninth hour Jesus shouted with a loud voice, “*Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?*” which means, “My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?”

MEN: When some of those standing there heard this, they said, “Listen, he’s calling Elijah!”

Minister: After this, knowing that everything had now been finished, and to fulfill the Scripture, Jesus said, “I thirst.”

WOMEN: A jar full of sour wine was sitting there. Immediately one of them ran, took a sponge, and soaked it with sour wine. Then he put it on a stick and gave him a drink.

Minister: When Jesus had received the sour wine, he said, “It is finished!” Jesus cried out with a loud voice, “Father, into your hands I commit my spirit!” When he had said this, he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.

CONGREGATION: Suddenly the temple curtain was torn in two from top to bottom. The earth shook and rocks were split. Tombs were opened, and many bodies of saints who had fallen asleep were raised to life. Those who came out of the tombs went into the holy city after Jesus' resurrection and appeared to many people.

Minister: When the centurion and those who were guarding Jesus with him saw the earthquake and how he cried out with a loud voice and breathed his last, they were terrified and began to glorify God, saying, "This man really was righteous. Truly this was the Son of God."

MEN: When all the groups of people who had gathered to see this spectacle saw what had happened, they returned home beating their chests.

CONGREGATION: All those who knew Jesus, and many women who had followed Jesus from Galilee and who had served him, were there, watching from a distance.

WOMEN: Among them were Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Joseph, Salome, and the mother of Zebedee's sons.

Minister: Since it was the Preparation Day, the Jews did not want the bodies left on the crosses over the Sabbath (because that Sabbath was a particularly important day).

CONGREGATION: They asked Pilate to have the men's legs broken and the bodies taken away.

MEN: So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first man who was crucified with Jesus, and then those of the other man.

Minister: But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. Instead, one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear. Immediately blood and water came out. The one who saw it has testified, and his testimony is true. He knows that he is telling the truth, so that you also may believe. Indeed, these things happened so that the Scripture would be fulfilled, "Not one of his bones will be broken." Again another Scripture says, "They will look at the one they pierced."

HISTORY OF THE PASSION, THE BURIAL OF JESUS

Minister: When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathaea, named Joseph, who was also a disciple of Jesus, but secretly for fear of the Jews. Joseph of Arimathaea, a prominent member of the council, was a good and righteous man. He had not agreed with their plan and action. He was looking forward to the kingdom of God. He boldly went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus.

CONGREGATION: Pilate was surprised that Jesus was already dead. He summoned the centurion and asked him if Jesus had been dead for a long time. When he learned from the centurion that it was so, he granted the body to Joseph.

MEN: Joseph bought a linen cloth, came, and took Jesus' body away.

WOMEN: Nicodemus, who earlier had come to Jesus at night, also came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-two pounds.

CONGREGATION: They took Jesus' body and bound it with linen strips along with the spices, in accord with Jewish burial customs.

Minister: There was a garden at the place where Jesus was crucified. And in the garden was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid.

MEN: So they laid Jesus there, because it was the Jewish Preparation Day, and the tomb was near.

WOMEN: Joseph took the body and laid it in his own new tomb that he had cut in the rock. He rolled a large stone over the tomb's entrance and left.

CONGREGATION: The women who had come with Jesus from Galilee followed after Joseph, and they observed the tomb and how Jesus' body was laid there.

WOMEN: Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses were watching where the body was laid. Then they returned and prepared spices and perfumes. On the Sabbath they rested according to the commandment.

Minister: On the next day, which was the day after the Preparation Day, the chief priests and Pharisees gathered in the presence of Pilate and said, "Sir, we remembered what that deceiver said while he was still alive: 'After three days I will rise again.' So give a command that the tomb be made secure until the third day. Otherwise his disciples might steal his body and tell the people, 'He is risen from the dead.' And this last deception will be worse than the first."

MEN: Pilate said to them, "You have a guard. Go, make it as secure as you know how."

CONGREGATION: So they went and made the tomb secure by sealing the stone and posting a guard.

HYMN: "Rest, O Christ, From All Your Labor" (CW #718:1-3)

♪ Rest, O Christ, from all Your labor;
Sleep within Your borrowed tomb.
Foes have crucified and bound You
Fast within death's narrow room.

Seven Words from the Cross

The crown of thorns candelabra is a beautiful work of ecclesiastical art and a vivid reminder of our Savior's passion.

Each candle represents one of the “Words” spoken by Jesus from the cross. The candles will be extinguished one by one as the seven words are read.

The last candle will not be extinguished, but carried into the sacristy. That candle will be restored to its place. It symbolizes the glorious hope of the resurrection.

I. Luke 23:33,34

When they came to the place called The Skull, they crucified him there with the criminals, one on his right and the other on his left. Jesus said, “Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.”

M: O Lord Jesus Christ, touch us with your hands which the sins of the world pierced with the nails, and forgive our ignorance, for Lord, we knew not, indeed we know not what we did in sinning against you. Touch us to forgive and to bless, O Lord, for your endless mercies' sake.

From the sixth hour until the ninth hour, there was darkness over all the land. About the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, "*Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?*" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

M: O Lord Jesus Christ, fill us with your faith since in your last agony you cried to your Father, 'My God, my God!' that no suffering, no shadow of doubt may darken our trust in God, nor separate us from your Father and ours, now or ever.

The Shepherd dies for sheep that love to wander

V. John 19:28,29

After this, knowing that everything had now been finished, and to fulfill the Scripture, Jesus said, "I thirst."

VII. Luke 23:44-46

It was now about the sixth hour, and darkness came over the whole land until the ninth hour, while the sun was darkened. Then the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Jesus cried out with a loud voice, “Father, into your hands I commit my spirit!” When he had said this, he breathed his last.

*The remaining candle, a symbol of our Lord himself,
is carried out of the chancel, symbolizing his burial.*

There is a moment of silence for reflection.

*But the silence is broken with a loud noise — the
‘Strepitus’ — that foreshadows the rending of Christ’s
tomb in triumph on Easter morning.*

The candle, still burning, is returned to its place.

The minister exits in silence.

*The congregation may remain for prayer and reflection,
before dispersing quietly into the night.*

the end of the story.
